

Facility Fee Payments for Outpatient Care Reduce Costs and Improve Outcomes








6.2 million visits in 2023 at six THOT-member health systems.

97 percent of visits are outpatient visits.

Outpatient clinics provide primary and specialty care in areas where access to care is typically limited.



- THOT members' investments in neighborhood clinics is part of a long-term strategy to increase access, reduce costs, and improve care.
- Nearly 90 percent of outpatient clinics are in neighborhoods with access to care challenges based on, for example, income, lack of insurance, health status, or transportation. Most are in neighborhoods with multiple obstacles to accessing needed care. (See maps on page 2.)
- These clinics provide uninsured Texans access to one of the most cost-effective, integrated options to access care, including preventive, primary, specialty, and, when needed, inpatient hospital, care.

Telehealth visits at patients' desired location


Outpatient visits include emergency department visits because a hospital ED is not considered part of the inpatient facility and visits billed as "observation" visits, where a patient is monitored in the hospital setting to determine if hospital admission is required.


